MOUNT OLIVET | A collection of University of Kentucky memorabilia and toy tractors add a personal touch to the office of newly hired Robertson County School Superintendent Sanford Holbrook.

The native of Morgan County, who has most recently been the assistant superintendent of Magoffin County Schools, is settling in to his new job, and in the process of moving his family to the district.

Meeting more members of the community, parents, retired teachers and community leaders is on his immediate to-do list.

"I want a strong relationship with the community," Holbrook said on Thursday. "It is one of the things I put an emphasis on as superintendent."

Holbrook has already met with each of the school board members, who hired him last month to replace David Murray, who took

office in 2014 then resigned for family reasons in 2015.

"It looks like our goals are in line with each other," Holbrook said. "The success of the students is what we want."

So far it appears RCS is financially in better shape than in the recent past, and staffing is nearly where it needs to be, he said.

Since 2013, RCS has been under the watchful eye of Kentucky Department of Education officials, following being identified as a state assisted district by the KDE.

Holbrook started as superintendent July 1.

"It is a new era for Robertson County Schools," he said.

Goals include a renewed push to have students excel in academics in the upcoming school year, he said.
